Principal's Message

OUR BISHOP: Most Reverend Vincent Long Van Nguyen

Bishop Vincent Long was born in 1961 in Dong Nai in Vietnam. Since the fall of Saigon in 1975, his family has been dispersed: his mother, brother and sister are in Melbourne, three brothers are in Holland, a sister remains in Vietnam, and Bishop Vincent is now in Parramatta. In 1984, he became a professed Conventual Franciscan friar (OFM Conv) and studied for the priesthood in Melbourne.



After his priestly ordination on 30 December in 1989, he was sent to Rome for further studies and was awarded a licentiate in Christology and Spirituality from

the Pontifical Faculty of St Bonaventure. He served as an assistant and then parish priest for seven years in Kellyville within the Diocese of Parramatta and for seven years in Springvale in Victoria before being elected Superior of the Order of Friars Minor Conventuals in Australia in 2005. He served as Assistant General in Rome from 2008 until 2011, responsible for the Asia-Oceania section of his Order.

In 2011, he was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Melbourne in which role he served for nearly five years. Bishop Vincent is the first Vietnamese born bishop to lead a diocese outside of Vietnam and the first Vietnamese born bishop in Australia. During that period, he was Episcopal Vicar for Justice and Peace and for Social Services and was Chair of the Catholic Education Commission (Victoria).

Nationally, Bishop Vincent is the Chair, Bishops Commission for Social Justice, Mission and Service. On 5 May 2016, he was appointed the fourth Bishop of Parramatta in succession to Bishop Anthony Fisher OP following his appointment as Archbishop of Sydney in 2014. On 16 June 2016, Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv was installed as the fourth Bishop of Parramatta at St Patrick's Cathedral, Parramatta.

Naplan provides teachers, parents and students information relating to a student's strengths and areas of need and enables teachers and students to develop learning goals in literacy and numeracy. 
- 1. Hover your cursor over 'About'








It is visible in the way we connect and communicate within our faith community and society. Our Cultural Background influences our expectations, Whole School Practice and shared values.


Using Context and Character and Cultural Background in Year 6

Dear Parents and Carers

As we welcome students and staff back to school for Term 3, I am writing to thank you for your strong support of Catholic education and pursuit of academic excellence. Faithful to Sacred Scripture and Tradition, Catholic Teaching and Values, our 80 schools are deeply committed to supporting children and young people to grow in faith, learning and wellbeing.

In Religious Education, our schools are using *Sharing Our Story*, a Religious Education Curriculum that has been used for more than twenty years. In all subject areas, Catholic schools offer an education completely consistent with the teaching of the Church on the dignity of all aspects of the human person. We also appreciate the need to provide age-appropriate learning opportunities.

Our staff are continuing to prepare for the new curriculum being released by the NSW Government through NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA). These changes are focused on the way that literacy and numeracy are taught. You can learn more about this here. Our schools also teach the NESA curriculum for Physical Education, Personal Development and Health. Further information about this is available here.

I recently met with the Council of Catholic School Parents to discuss the importance of partnerships between families and schools. Partnerships between parents/carers and schools that are based on trust and mutual respect are vital in supporting each child to achieve their best throughout their school journey.

As a system of low-fee paying Catholic schools, the modest fees that parents and carers can contribute help us to meet costs including wages for our dedicated staff. 2023 Non-Government Schools Census collection notice

The Australian Government Department of Education (the department) would like to advise all staff, parents and guardians that it will collect certain information about your school, its staff and student body as part of the 2023 Non-Government School Census collection (the Census).

How and what information is collected for the Census?

Census information is provided to the department by your school legal entity (the approved authority) via the <u>SchoolsHUB website</u>.

The Census provides information about your school and the number and characteristics of the school's staff and student body during a specific reference period. Characteristics collected through the Census include:

- · teaching and non-teaching staff
- students' year level and workload
- students' gender and age (as on 1 July 2023)
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff and students
- · students with disability
- students receiving distance education
- · boarding and overseas students.

The names of students and staff are not collected, apart from the name, position and contact details of the staff member nominated as the primary contact for the Census.

Census special circumstances applications

Census special circumstances applications may also be made by schools to include a student/s who did not attend during the Census reference period but otherwise meets Census eligibility requirements. Schools will provide the department with information and documents about the student demonstrating their eligibility. The department does not require personal information about a student and asks schools to de-identify any documents before providing them.

Purpose of the Census collection

The information provided during the Census is collected by the department in accordance with the *Australian Education Act 2013* (the Act) and the *Australian Education Regulation 2013* (the Regulation). The Act and the Regulation require the legal entity responsible for the administration of the school (the approved authority) to provide this information to the department to:

- Ensure the provision of Australian Government funding to schools is properly calculated and appropriately managed.
- Conduct research, statistical analysis and develop school education policy for the Australian Government.
- Meet national and international reporting obligations on school students in Australia.
- Publish and provide information about schools to the public.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identified individual or an individual who is reasonably identifiable.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with the Privacy Act, the Act and Regulation and any other applicable laws.

Your personal information provided to the department through the Census may be:

- Used or disclosed by the department for the purposes outlined above under the heading Purposes of the Census collection.
- Disclosed to the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) to publish
 on the My School website and include as high-level data for ACARA's National Report on
 Schooling in Australia.
- Disclosed to state and territory government departments and authorities in accordance with the Act and Regulation.
- Disclosed to Australian Government departments and authorities in accordance with the Act and Regulation.
- Disclosed to non-government school representative bodies in accordance with the Act and Regulation.
- Disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department decides to audit or verify the
 information provided by an approved authority about a school. The contracted auditor may use
 previously collected information or request access to individual student records for comparison
 purposes. The contractors may pass this information onto officers within the department, if there
 is a discrepancy in the data provided by the school and the school's records and further
 investigation is required. The contracted auditor must handle personal information in accordance
 with the Privacy Act.
- Disclosed to its service providers for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology support services to the department.
- Used to validate data from other collections undertaken by the department.
- Used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law including under the Act or Regulation, or otherwise permitted under the Privacy Act.



Other than in exceptional circumstances (for example, investigation of fraud relating to overseas students), the department does not disclose any of the personal information collected to overseas recipients.

You can find the department's privacy policy on the <u>Department of Education</u> website or request a copy from the department at <u>privacy@education.gov.au</u>. The privacy policy includes information about how to access or correct personal information held about you or your child, how to make a complaint about a breach of the Australian Privacy Principles and how the department will deal with such a complaint.

What do you need to do?

You are not required to do anything. The approved authority of the school is responsible for providing the information to the department.
