Principal's Message



Why do We have the Mini Vinnies @ at StMMs

Dear Parents, Guardians, Boys and Girls,

Housing is a human right, but on any given night in Australia more than 116,000 people are homeless. Homelessness doesn't discriminate – the homeless population comprises people of all ages and backgrounds. For some, homelessness is a one-off occurrence. For others, it is a prolonged experience that may be interspersed with periods of being housed. The experience of homelessness in Australia can also vary greatly – from sleeping on the

streets or moving between temporary situations, to living in a crowded or unsafe dwelling that effects a person's ability to participate in family and community life.

There is simply not enough affordable housing to meet demand, and the situation has been getting steadily worse. Growing numbers of people are living without secure accommodation or are experiencing housing stress (paying more than 30 per cent of household income on their housing)... Australia has no national plan to tackle the housing affordability and homelessness crisis. Deep and sustained reform is urgently needed on a number of fronts.

Refugees and Migrants

Many countries in the world do not enjoy the peace and democracy of Australia. This can often lead to terrible conflict and warfare, and persecution of minority groups in much of the world.... This forces many millions of people around the world to migrate out of their home countries. A small number of these people use their human right under the Refugee Convention to come to Australia and seek asylum here. We are fortunate enough to be a wealthy country, with the ability to welcome many of the people who seek safety here, and in turn we benefit enormously from their skills, perspectives and experiences.

The St Vincent de Paul Society has a long history of helping migrants and refugees. They do this both by providing services to asylum seekers and refugees in Australia, and by advocating to government on their behalf. Their services include providing financial and information support to migrants and refugees, for example through home visitation, food and financial help, visits to detention centres, and homework centres. Their main areas of concern are the negative outcomes of detention centres, which they absolutely oppose, and inadequate financial support for refugees and asylum seekers living in the community. This event really sets a foundation for us to have conversations about the importance of ACTION rather than just words. Our words show intent...our ACTIONS make the difference. Jesus moved from his words to ACTION....he made a difference. We are seeking to instil this characteristic in the children at StMM's.
